The first year I bought helmets I got a black hen with one bull eye. I was told that breeding from one bull eye wouldn't hurt. Well this bull eye kept showing up over and over until I finally decided to cull every one that showed up, no matter how good it was otherwise. That was the only way to get rid of it. I did the same thing with droopers and I don't get either one now. My understanding is that the person that told me it was ok to breed with the single bull eye showed a few blacks with single bull eyes at the Canadian National this year. I asume because they were some of his best birds. As Jim is saying, he was a loser at the Nationals. All because he didn't think it would hurt to breed from a single bull eye. Doesn't hurt em eh??? Jim is right. I am going to start culling all birds with cracked eyes. I get very few but if you want to get rid of it completely that is what you have to do.

Where cracked eyes are concerned I think it is important to know the reason for the cracked eye. I believe based solely on anecdotal evidence that cracked eyes can be inherited or they can be the result of damage. I had a season some years ago where I had cracked eyes all over the loft in families that had never had the problem. I had other medical problems in the loft that year. The cracked eyed birds I kept I bred out of without out ever seeing another cracked eye in any of the families. On the other hand I bought a cracked eyed hen four or five years ago and 50% of her young were cracked eyed and her young and grandchildren still throw cracked eyes soooo I conclude that unless you know better if they are really good birds try them out but be careful.
